3	Waterworks bills tapped to climb (New Zealand Herald Wayne Thompson) Water and sewerage bills to climb due to huge waste water and stormwater cleanup projects. \$11 billion worth of infrastructure needs to be maintained and replaced.
12	New Zealand National Maritime Museum-new trustee (East and Bays Courier Darren Risby) David Jackson is appointed and appears well qualified
15	Building boom leads to cowboy builders, illegal workers and unsafe sites (New Zealand Herald David Eames) in a survey of 110 building sites in South Auckland's flat bush area it was necessary to close 35 immediately due to problems including unsafe tools inadequate fencing lack of safety firework and builders blocking footpaths.
17	\$11 million for landscaping (New Zealand Herald Ainsley Thompson) This is the amount to be spent landscaping four new six prisons throughout New Zealand. In Auckland the woman's prison at Wiri will cost \$1.98 million.
21	Auckland Domestic Terminal (NZH Stuart Dye) The proposed Domestic Terminal \$42,000,000 makeover is described the existing facility was built as a cargo building in the 1960s. The upgraded terminal should be operational in the early part of 2007.
24	Long Bay "Great Park" rejected (New Zealand Herald Wayne Thompson) Long Bay planning commission has backed developer's plans despite public opposition. A public hearing on the structure plans last November drew more than 10,000 submissions, mostly in opposition. Commissioners took note that North shore City Council could not afford to buy 200 ha, to add to the existing Park of 152 ha. The Commissioners included mayor George Wood.
